








says the marriage counsellor.


"In fact, I spend a good deal of my time helping people to get ready for it. Now, let's see you've know each other for-?"

## LEN'S SHIP OF DREAMS

It's a story of hope, following in a father's footsteps, and perhaps most fascinating of all, (near) tragedy!

This is the story of St Vincent's Bardon resident, Len, and his father who helped build, the Titanic.





For a lot of people, the Titanic conjures up thoughts of gloom and doom. For others it conjures up images of Leonardo DiCaprio outstretched on the boat's front deck proclaiming he's king of the world.

But for Len, it's all about a reminder of his Dad's story, interwoven with the near tragedy of him going on the ocean liner's maiden voyage.

"My father riveted those in place," Len says. His eyes gleam with pride as he points to the portholes wrapped around the outside of the boat. "He [Dad] had a ticket for the maiden voyage and would have worked in the boiler room. But, he begged off [the boat] as my mum pregnant with my older brother was due anytime. The year was 1912. I wasn't born yet but would not have been at all if my father went on board the ship."

Len's father Jack was a boilermaker who worked on what was, in the early 1900s, the world's largest and most luxurious vessel built in the docks of Belfast, Northern Ireland.





Len was born in Belfast in 1926, the eighth of nine children. With all children in tow, the Greer family boarded a ship which, fortunately unlike the Titanic, made it from Belfast to its destination – Melbourne Australia in 1927. Len was just a year old when the family moved and only the ninth and youngest child, his sister Irene, was born in Australia.

Len followed in his father's footsteps and became a builder himself. As a mechanical engineer, he worked with heavy machinery, on manufacturing plants, and in construction. A man of many hats, he is proudest of his leadership in the Australian Scouting Movement as District Commissioners in Queensland in the 1970s and 80s.

But for the team at Bardon, he is their Len who brightens up their day with his smile and yarn or two of the "Ship of Dreams" that brought his whole family to Australia.

How's that for a historical connection!




